

The Ramp Loan Program (RRLP) has been changing lives and increasing the independence for our clients.

Every ramp offers freedom of movement. Giving clients the ability to get in and out of their homes, often for the first time in years. Clients are able to go to doctor's appointments, shop, or engage in social activities. All the things that enable one to live in their own homes and communities.

The RRLP serves areas from Eureka to McKinleyville, with 3 or fewer steps. Recovery: Recovery is based on my specific disabilities. Recovery to me isn't about substance abuse... It's about me living with my disabilities, living securely, and living independently with self-determination.

I started on my disability journey in 2016. It was incredibly difficult at first, then I got involved with TCIL and the HOPE Center. I learn and use coping skills I pick up from friends, peer support groups, and organizations like Tri-County.

Community support has provided the help I needed to become skilled at managing very difficult challenges. Now I am looking forward to living each day with less stress and more freedom and happiness.

In my life right now I am really loving painting. I have been experimenting with watercolors and acrylic paints on many different kinds of surfaces. I am now moving into ceramic painting, my art keeps me alive and stable.


Over the past year TCIL Del Norte has become an increasingly cozy and welcoming space.

TCIL's AT Assistant Elizabeth uses this mouse daily. She uses it to help with the wrist/hand pain and discomfort she experiences when she uses a regular mouse. It allows her to rest her arm/hand on her leg, the arm of her chair, desk, or mid-air, while navigating and scrolling her computer. It requires only the thumb to move the cursor, allowing the arm and wrist to be kept still.



"This mouse has saved my wrist and hand! It took a minute to get used to the trackball, but I picked it up quickly and now I can't imagine working at a computer without it!"

Andy Padilla's Story: TCIL Youth Coordinator and Client

Something special about Centers for Independent Living is that many staff members are also clients. I am both the Youth Coordinator and a TCIL client. As a client I receive services through TCIL and the Association of Programs for Rural Independent Living (APRIL). This year I had two success stories as a client.



Andy with Assistive Tech

Firstly, I set an assistive technology Independent Living goal. My goal was to gain access to A.T. that would make reading easier and more enjoyable to me, a dyslexic. With TCIL's help, I was able to sample using a Bone Conductive headset and enroll in California's Braille and Talking Book Library. Both have increased my access to text to speech technology that make reading accessible for me.

My other success was accessing peer support services. I joined APRIL's peer support program for young community leaders with disabilities. The group helped me to build resilience. I was later invited to an empowerment program hosted by APRIL. I made friends through the program who helped me to grow my resiliency. In October, I attended APRIL's national conference, got to learn from Disability Rights Movement leaders, and was celebrated as part of the next generation of the movement's leaders.

TCIL Del Norte Advocacy and Outreach

The Del Norte & Adjacent Tribal Lands community took on an ambitious task: Introduce all students to sources of strengths and build resiliency skills through a yearly 3 part event series called, the Youth Wellness Summit (YWS). At the Summits, students meet community organizations that can support them, play games that build resilience, and learn about sources of strengths.

TCIL helped reduce noise levels which youth last year identified as overstimulating. TCIL also helped to create an outdoor space youth could retreat to for relaxation.





Emergency Preparation

7 Essential Items for Emergency Preparation

Water: You should have about 10 quarts of water per person in your home of clean water in your home to be used for drinking and food preparation purposes.

Food: Food that is packaged as meals which can be stored in the home. And food that can be easily carried and be stored for quite some time, such as protein bars.

Backpack: You will need to have something to carry the things you need for emergency purposes. You should have a "bug-out" backpack that contains the essential items.

Medical Supplies: A first aid kit is essential as it can treat small injuries before they become big problems. The medical supplies should contain all prescription medications you and your family needs.

Radio: A radio allows you to hear vital information that can assist in your survival. You should purchase radios that are powered by a hand-crank, so no batteries are needed.

Multitool: A proper multitool contains what you need to survive starting with a knife for slicing and defense, pliers for pulling, scissors for cutting, and a myriad of other tools all in one easy to carry device.

Lighter or Fire Starter: Fire can cook your food, keep you protected, and warm your body so you can survive. You should carry more than one method of starting a fire. A fire starter kit uses multiple methods of starting a fire. Plus, having a lighter and box of matches gives you backup options.
